SIDE ONE

1. THE PANEL: "I've drank just about anything that has alcohol, Bay Rum, canned heat, and auto radiator alcohol strained through bread. . . . Our 4 experts tell how life is really lived and your Skid Row I. Q. will increase as you learn how to raise the price of a "flop" and what to do for the "chuck horrors". This record explains some of the problems these men overcame with the help of the Lord through the world wide facilities of the Salvation Army Harbor Light Centers.

2. INSTANT MUSIC: The Kulas Foundation (Frank E. Joseph, secretary) awarded grants of \$14,405 to expand the music program of the Cleveland Center. A 3 year program was planned by Major Dimond, assisted by Richard Kauffman, of the Music School Settlement. During the final year the technique of INSTANT MUSIC was developed by registered music therapist, Harvey Hall, assisted by supervisor Louise Steele, RMT. This recorded demonstration covers the first session which begins with the introduction to the instruments and ends with the actual playing of a song. Pupils are middle aged alcoholics with little or no previous musical experience. The Beginner's Orchestra features Charles Allen, who started on baritone sax at age 62, and Bill Wagner on trumpet and Earl Lucas on alto sax, both in their 50's. Old pro John Richardson, helps on tenor sax assisted by the Combo rhythm section.

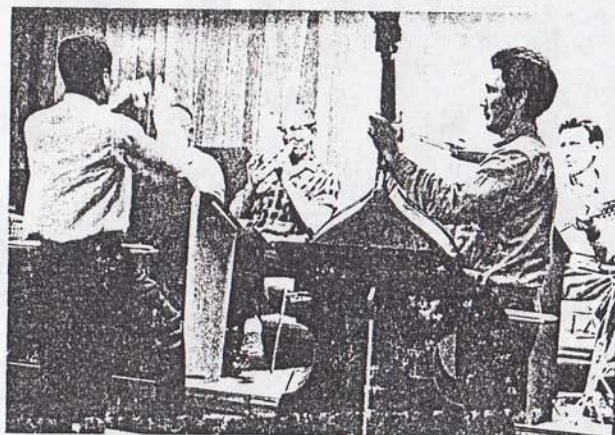
