It' hard to say exactly which meeting was first in our area or region, because our region has changed twice. Iwill try to tell you how I started in Narcotics Anonymous.

In September, 1977, I was an active drug user in Bolder, Colorado, and I hit my bottom. Fortunately, I was admitted into Harmony in Estes Park, which was run by a man who was my A.A. sponsor. I had been taken to Harmony by two men who, with me were later to become founding members of Narcotics Anonymous in Boulder, although, at the time, we were unaware of this.

During my stay at Harmony, I met and talked with a counselor who had been a member of N.A. in Chicago, in the late 1950's. During my last few days at Harmony, this man gently hammered into my mind, that if I planned on being on this planet for the remainder of 1977, I must be willing to go to any lengths to find Narcotics Anonymous.

Upon Leaving Harmony, I returned to Boulder and slept on a fellow A.A. members couch. I talked to this fellow about what the counselor had told me about Narcotics Anonymous. We began to call information all over the United States, in an attempt to locate Narcotics Anonymous. We called every day for a week, with no success. We called New York City, Miami, Los Angeles, San FranCisco, the A.A. Central Office, and even the Department of Alcohol and Drug Abuse, but no one that we talked to had heard of Narcotics Anonymous.

I went back to an A.A. meeting in Boulder. I told the group that I wanted to start a Narcotics Anonymous meeting in their meeting hall on a different night. The group conscious took a vote and unamiously voted (32-0), that Narcotics Anonymous could have it's own self supporting group.

Our first meeting was scheduled to be held on Monday, October 4, 1977. We made up flyers, and posted them all other town. On the night of the first meeting, Both myself and the other fellow who helped me plan the meeting ended up having to work overtime at our jobs, so we were unable to make it to the meeting. The first meeting consisted of a counselor from Harmony, a resident from a halfway house, and two members of A.A. from Boulder. The group became the "N.A. BOULDER GROUP ONE". The group still meets today at 6:30 P.M. in the same place. We currently have 50-60 active members, and 200 clean, sober periodic members.

I then recieved a call from a counselor at St. Lukes Hospital in Denver. She told me that a group called the ALPHA-OMEGA group started in August at the Downtown Center Club.

In April 1978, I attended the World Service Conference . I was elected the regional representative for Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Arizona, Oaklahoma Montana; and Nevada.

Because this is an anonymous program, I am unable to name those individual who have been a major part of helping me find Narcotics Anonymous in Boulder. As God would have it, most of those individuals are still sober Two of them have not been seen here since 1980. The counselor who first tol me about Narcotics Anonymous, never became a member of our group. Two weeks after our conversation, this member went back to an active addiction and died in a car accident. He had been sober in A.A. for eleven years. We learned first hand from the man who gave us N.A., that "Addicts die without Narcotics Anonymous".

Our region now consists of the Colorado-Wyoming region. We have a 24 hour hotline, and approximately thirty meetings a week. We have regional service meeting regularly, and put out new meeting lists every four months. Colorado Region

Basically a lot of public service about drug abuse in Colorado on TV. It's not affiliated with NA and we're trying to get in there and reach the addict who still cuffers.
